

#### **METHODS**

• MPhil thesis at University of Oxford in Comparative Politics (2020-2022)

- Survey of 106 countries to identify 20 hubs
- Consultations with 5 experts
- My experience of 10 years interviewing/training/advising leaders in the sector (South Africa, Kenya, etc)
- Desk research

#### • 2 qualitative case studies

- 23 semi-structured interviews
- 2 weeks in São Paulo + Delhi virtual
- Process tracing
- Document analysis
- Builds on literature in: political sociology, social movement theory, collective action, innovation diffusion
